HISTORICAL GEOGRAPHY: EDITORIAL UPDATE

Prevent of William Wyckoff's wonderfully illustrated and insightful Distinguished Historical Geographer lecture, originally presented at the American Association of Geographers' meeting in April. Our full issue, released in December, features Wyckoff's text at the head, along with an exciting special issue, regular research articles, and book reviews.

Our special issue section highlights recent scholarship in Feminist Historical Geographies. Co-edited by Tamar Rothenberg, Karen M. Morin, and Mona Domosh, this collection of papers emerged from lively sessions at the International Conference of Historical Geographers in London in 2015. In addition to thanking them for shepherding these papers to publication, we echo the co-editors' hope that these papers inspire continuing scholarly exploration of critical and feminist historical geographies.

Regular research articles in Volume 44 reflect the growing diversity of historical geographical scholarship, in subject matter, regional focus, and historical period. Christopher Hewitt deploys historical GIS insights to reconsider the site of the Battle of Hastings, while Kyle Evered and Emine Önhan Evered explore discourses of public health and social order in the early Turkish republic. And as usual, we feature a rich selection of book reviews, curated and edited by book review editor, John Bauer. As many readers will know, book reviews are now also published twice yearly, and are open access from the date of publication (as is the Distinguished Historical Geographer lecture).

As always, we encourage submissions that use diverse digital media forms for both analysis and presentation.
